
Preschool Pages: Monster Mayhem

Wordless picture books are great for building visual literacy and giving your child a chance to tell you the story!






Simple text with colorful, humorous illustrations convey the message that everyone is different.






Author/Illustrator Spotlight

















Beyond the Book!

Wordless picture books are proof your child can create a book on their own without needing to write words! Plus drawing is a great way to build early writing skills - letters are formed using shapes, after all, and practicing holding crayons and markers uses the same muscles needed to write with a pencil later on. You and your child can each draw your own wordless picture book! Then you can take turns reading the book each other, interpreting one another's pictures as you go.

Mila is afraid of monsters, a fear that comes out at night. On the other hand, the main character in *I Will Read to You* loves those beasts and seeks them out, even at bedtime! Differences exist and make us the unique beings we are. Talking about differences, even between characters in books, helps normalize them and also helps to decrease bias. Use books to comfortably explore and celebrate differences!
